In particular, **David Roth and Bridget Shoe** have worked together over the last several months as part of the team that produces our virtual services.



This is no easy task. Several days before each service, David and Bridget review the order of service created by Rev. Mitra and Claire Wagner. In this preproduction review, the duo is involved in deciding which camera will be in play at what point in the service and how the speakers and prerecorded videos will transition and interact with each other. On Sundays, they spend an hour before the service begins rehearsing with the ushers, Rev Mitra, and any speakers. They often have to make adjustments on the fly when the service commences, taking a deep breath when Zoom throws them a curve and calmly making corrections where needed.



St. John's is beginning to emerge from the pandemic and services are becoming more complex as we move to a hybrid in person/virtual model, which challenges David, Bridget, and the production team even further.

Through all this, David and Bridget have risen to the occasion with enthusiasm, energy, and good cheer. The results are services that all of us can enjoy. Thank you, David and Bridget!

August 17, 2021

If you haven't yet met our Spirit Award winner, **Debbie Combs**, you'll be charmed by her soft-spoken, friendly presence but you'd never guess how important her volunteer contributions are to the operations of St. John's. She's our church Historian/Librarian and our library downstairs gleams from her attention. As Historian she continues to organize and weed out redundancies in all the historical documents of the church. No one here knows better than Debbie the history of St. John's. During Covid, she used her institutional memory and love for the details in bylaws and policy to do a complete review of SJ policies.



In a year-long project to make sure our policies reflect the changes in Board structure and the removal of councils as adopted by the congregation in 2019, she and the Board secretary consulted with other church leaders to improve many other aspects of our policies and by laws. A huge project, it resulted in four distinct policy manuals: Personnel, Safe Congregations, Finance, and General Board policies. (All these can be seen under "our governance" on the website.) Debbie also acts as a SJ liaison with KUUJAN (Kentucky Unitarian Universalist Justice Action Network).

Working with others, she is currently creating a land acknowledgement - a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of the land on which we worship. While we deeply appreciate all those who save our congregation fiscally by doing jobs we would normally pay to have done, Debbie is one of those who does things that would never be considered in our budget, but which nonetheless enrich our experience immeasurably. Thank you, Debbie.

September 28 and October 5, 2021

While we are forever grateful for the many volunteers who make St. John's Sunday service available to all, we think our **online ushers** deserve a special Spirit award for the integral part they play on behalf of our virtual congregation. They welcome you; during the service they monitor, list links, and post details in chat so you won't miss a thing, and after, in online coffee hour, they make sure you get a fair chance to share, almost as if you were in the building. Each week, a team of two are viewing and working the chat at home from their own computer screens, reporting what you see so the producers in the building can adjust as needed.
