
### August 23, 2022





As a new Board President in 2019, it became his job to request police aid to keep the congregation safe from the threats of a mentally ill person who wished us harm. In 2020, it was Covid that threatened us. Matt had to make the decision to close St. John's doors for the duration. He secured the government loan that allowed us to keep our precious staff in the interim. Through it all, with the cat or baby Theodore on his lap, Matt furthered St. John's work over Zoom. To this day, his wicked sense of humor, positive attitude, and firm determination continues to keep us balanced.

Triathletes train to achieve endurance, strength, and speed, and Matt loves the sport. His long-time devotion to crossing the finish line no matter what the obstacles serves us well. # October 25, 2022

Howard Tolley is being recognized with a Spirit Award for his unwavering support of the St. John's Men's Group, which held its annual retreat last week. Howard was a founding member of this vital group that meets monthly for dinner and discussion. Over 30+ years, he has fostered the space of relationship and understanding that continues to mean so much to the men of St. John's.

Howard has been in the forefront promoting relationships and understanding in many social justice arenas. For more than 50 years, he worked for racial justice as an educator, as a non-violent but strident organizer, and as a member of the



American Association of University Professors fighting systemic racism. He was also one of the founders and earliest organizers of the Unitarian Universalist Justice Ohio state action network.

In response to worldwide human rights violations, Howard wrote books, journal articles, and lectured, both nationally and internationally. With the Urban Morgan Institute for Human Rights, he organized an

online program for teaching human rights at the university level. When he retired from the University of Cincinnati as a professor of political science, he earned a law degree and served the American Arbitration Association as an arbitrator and the Ohio State Employment Relations Board, as a fact finder and hearing officer. And among other things, he is a leading voice against the death penalty in Ohio.

We have benefited greatly from Howard's participation in many capacities at St. John's from teaching RE to children and adults all the way to serving on the board. His expertise and backing of our social justice initiatives has helped us widen our reach. He is gracious in answering questions from any concerned group and helps to support local equality and justice causes here or in his and Nina's winter Arizona home community. We are grateful to know and honor you, Howard, and we'll all be wishing you a very happy birthday on Oct. 30!

This Spirit Award goes to Nicole Stanforth, our rainbow-haired burst of enthusiasm. We honor her for the outstanding job she's done over the years in teaching us about how to understand and fight suicide. This year alone, representing St. John's, her walking team, "Side with Love," raised \$2,234.00 for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

# December 27, 2022

A much-deserved Spirit Award goes to our St. John **KUUJAN** (**Kentucky UU Justice Action Network**) team and those who supported them. The main issue to champion was abortion rights. One initiative that could make a difference was contacting ex-felons who might not know they had the right to vote. A proliferation of postcards and yard signs went out - some with links for checking ex-felon voting status and including the link for registration - some explaining the implications of voting "yes" for the constitutional amendment ending the right to an abortion and giving it a resounding "no."



According to the Pew Research Center, 64% of the population of Kentucky lean toward the Republican



party and of those, 54% are Evangelical Protestants. In June, immediately after the Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, the State Legislature banned abortion. As you can see, the battle for defeating that ban in the November primary was decidedly uphill. Despite that, voters in Kentucky firmly rejected the issue that denied abortion rights under the state constitution!

Those at St. John's who contributed to the fight are too numerous to name but Wanda Crawford, Joetta Prost, Debbie Potochnik, Linda Heath, and Roberto Henriquez were in the forefront. A heartfelt thank you to all who fought that important battle for women's rights.
